Jan. 4, 2020 – 12th Night Revelries Featured Summer Event 300th Anniversary of Amity Township Historic House Tour Saturday, July 20, 2019 • 10am-4pm

The Historic Preservation Trust of Berks County (HPTBC) will be celebrating the 300th anniversary of Amity Township with an exciting living history open house. A continuation of our 3rd Saturday programs, this event will consist of various demonstrations and activities and take place throughout Morlatton Village.

Visitors will be able to tour all four eighteenth century buildings that comprise the Village: the White Horse Tavern, the George Douglass House, the Mouns Jones House, and the Michael Fulp House. There will also be archaeological excavations of the 1716 Mouns Jones House and visitors can view an exhibit of the Amity Heritage Society. At the George Douglass House, visitors can see the ongoing restoration of this 1765 mansion. In the White Horse Tavern guests can enjoy dancing demonstrations courtesy of the Amity Colonial Dancers.

Admission is a \$10 suggested donation. Light refreshments will be provided.







Additional Upcoming Events

3rd Saturday Programs at Morlatton Village

This year's series will celebrate Morlatton Village and the 300th anniversary of Amity Township. These site-wide programs are offered May-October and include various formats and topics such as exhibits, demonstrations, interactive sessions, and oral and graphic presentations. Tours of Morlatton Village will be offered when applicable. Program begins at the White Horse Inn. Suggested donation \$2/person. All proceeds benefit the Trust.

William Penn and the Swede's Tract May 18, 2019 • 11am

Join us as we kick off our Spring programs with Doug Miller, Director of Pennsbury Manor. Mr. Miller will discuss William Penn's role in establishing Amity Township from the Swede's Tract, and related aspects of early Amity Township.

Mouns Jones Licensed Indian Trader

June 15, 2019 • 11am

Historians Larry Ward and Brad Kissam will discuss the exciting and interesting life of Mouns Jones. Builder of the earliest standing structure in Berks County, Mouns Jones was also a successful Indian Trader and interpreter in the early eighteenth century Manatawny region.

Household Inventories from the Oley Valley

August 17, 2019 • 11am

Historian and former Site Administrator of Landis Valley Village and Farm Museum, Jim Lewars, will offer an exciting program on inventories from the Oley Valley. Visitors will learn what interesting and unexpected things these household and farm inventories can tell us about life in the eighteenth century.

Joint Archaeological Exhibit September 21, 2019 • 10am-3pm

A continuation of our 3rd Saturday programs, this event will consist of various demonstrations and activities and take place primarily at the Mouns Jones House. The Society of Pennsylvania Archaeology, Chapter 21, along with the HPTBC will present the latest archaeological findings at the 1716 Mouns Jones House. Chapter 21 conducts several archaeological excavations throughout the year at the property and has uncovered numerous artifacts over the years relating to the history of this important structure. The Mouse Jones House is the oldest standing building in Berks County. The Amity Heritage Society will also have an exhibit.

Mistress Douglass and Mr. Douglass at Home October 19, 2019 • 11am

Join Trust volunteers Courtney McKay Stevens and Omar Hottenstein, dressed in eighteenth century period clothing, as they portray Mr. & Mrs. George Douglass and receive visitors in their 1765 Georgian mansion. Mary Piersall Douglass will speak about her life at home with Mr. Douglass and their family and friends. A man of Scotland, George Douglass prospered as a businessman in the early Manatawny region. Please note, this program will take place at the George Douglass House in Morlatton Village.

Sites & Structures Update



During the 2019 restoration season, the Trust will substantially complete multi-year projects on the Mouns Jones and George Douglass houses, returning them to their respective 1716 and 1765 architectural forms, as documented by extensive evidence carefully and faithfully considered and executed by our committee and its consultants and skilled artisans engaged in the restoration campaigns.

The most remarkable exterior features on the restored principal elevations will include are-created pent roof and a restored plaster cove cornice

across the 1765 Douglass façade, and symmetrical arrangement of windows flanking the vertical axis through the 1716 date-stone above the re-centered

doorway in the Mouns Jones house. The doorway and window openings will be spanned for the first time in a century and a half by stone lintels similar to, but proportionately more massive than, the original surviving lintels above the 2d story windows in the opposite wall.

During the winter just ending, our project plasterer, working on his 20th National Register structure, continued the interior work in the George Douglass house, restoring wall integrity in the 2d floor chambers and hallway. Defective or missing lath was replaced or stabilized in-place. Historically authentic lime plaster was employed for the base and finish coatings, reinforced with animal hair as found in the original 1765 plaster







composition. Each chamber was warmed to 50 degrees+ throughout the curing period for new plaster.

A doorway between the two Douglass northern chambers was determined to be not original to the pre-Revolution period and was closed up with planking and lath, and plastered over. Chair railing conforming to the surviving 1765 profile was applied across the former doorway opening. "Blind" partitions, lacking passage doorways and providing privacy in the separated spaces, and a division of the domestic and commercial functions within the building, were installed between the two northern chambers on the 2d floor and between the kitchen and front ("store") room on the first floor. Several hundred square feet of stable and intact plasterwork on chamber walls will be preserved as a demonstration of undisturbed architectural fabric and un-coated original surface.

The stonework now underway on the Mouns Jones House is fully funded. However, completion of the restoration campaign depends on obtaining funds for replacement of the door and windows in the riverside wall, and second floor joists with old white-oak timbers, which are rare and expensive.
