2022 Open Houses at Morlatton Village

Summer Open House & Declaration of Independence Reading Monday, July 4 • 2pm

To celebrate Independence Day, the Trust in cooperation with Amity Township, the Friends of Hopewell Furnace, and the Society of Pennsylvania Archaeology John Shrader Chapter 21 will host an inspirational reading of the Declaration of Independence accompanied with music and traditional patriotic songs. The program features Berks Opera Company's Francine Black and writer, actress, director, and educator Christine Emmert.

The first public reading of the Declaration in Berks County was on July 8, 1776, and it was read publicly in villages throughout the area. The Declaration was officially adopted in Philadelphia at 2pm on July 4, 1776. The reading at the White Horse marks the hour of our nation's 246th birthday.

The Archaeologists will also present their work with a display of artifacts that have been unearthed at the Mouns Jones site and other buildings throughout Morlatton Village will be open for viewing. The reading will be staged on the porch of the eighteenth-century White Horse Tavern and admission is free. To enjoy the event, people are encouraged to bring a blanket or lawn chairs.



Archaeology Site & George Douglass Mansion Open House Saturday, September 17 • 10am-3pm

Join us for the re-dedication of The Shelley-Pendleton Education Center and the reopening of the George Douglass Mansion. Visitors will be welcomed into the Mansion by Mistress Mary Douglass, and Trust volunteers will discuss the restoration of the building. In addition, the Society of Pennsylvania Archaeology, Chapter 21 will also present their latest archaeological findings at the Mouns Jones House. Chapter 21 conducts several archaeological excavations throughout the year at the property and has uncovered numerous artifacts over the years relating to the history of this important structure. The Mouns Jones House, built in 1716, is the oldest standing building in Berks County.

The presentation will feature the early struggles and defeats and finally the Redemption at the Forks of the Ohio. Mr. Otto has been a re-enactor for over 30 years and has served on the Board of Directors for the Friends of Conrad Weiser.

Sites & Structures Committee Report, Spring 2022

In September 2021, the Trust completed a major four-year project to restore the 1765 George Douglass House. The work, partially funded by PHMC's historic restoration grant program, proceeded through the worst of the Pandemic under conditions allowing only one craftsman in the building on each workday. Carpentry, joinery, and coordination with other craftsmen were accomplished within time and Pandemic constraints by Tom and Chris Lainhoff.

Major elements of the project included:

A. Flooring repair, stabilization, replacement where necessary with old boards of the same

white oak species and range of widths as the originals, restoration of preserved original boards, and joist framing;

B. Installation of original and replicated woodwork in the best and back parlors, including windows, box-frame, casings, door framing, corner cupboards, fireplace surrounds, wainscot paneling, cornices, and painting of woodwork in both parlors with scientifically determined original colors;

C. Re-creation of the board and plaster partitions

between the best and back parlors and between the kitchen and Amity-Store room;

D. Restoration of the original deteriorated plastered cove cornice on the original curved rafter-brackets under the

E. Re-creation of the shingled and ceiled pent roof across the principal [front] façade, and construction of a gabled hood over the doorway;

F. Restoration of defective or missing plasterwork in first floor front [best] parlor, dining parlor, store room, and

kitchen; this work involved extensive repair and structural consolidation of segments of the wood and masonry substrates for re-plastering, and using 19th century sawn lath for new plaster on the partitions; whitewashing was applied over old stable plaster and on repaired areas after adequate curing of the plaster.



MOUNS JONES HOUSE

The stonework on the Mouns Jones House has now been completed. Fortunately, this part of the project was fully funded by prior matching grants and donations. However, completion of the restoration campaign depends on obtaining funds for replacement of the door and leaded-glass windows in the riverside wall, installation of floor boards on the in-place repurposed oak joists, and re-fabrication of the partition wall between the hall/kitchen and the parlor. Fortunately, old floor

boards had been donated by the late Donald and Esther Shelley, saving the Trust a considerable amount, and their foundation has pledged to match 100% of every dollar gifted toward these elements, so critical to the authentic restoration of this early treasure.
